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## BLESSINGS OF SAME-SEX MARRIAGES OR CIVIL UNIONS

Jesus said:

*“My command is this: love each other as I have loved you.”*

*John 15:12*

And again

*“I pray for those who will believe in me ... that all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and I am in you. May they also be in us, ...so that they may be brought to complete unity...”*

*From John 17:20-23*

Bishops Justin and Eleanor recently held several roadshows around the Diocese to brief members of our diocesan family on matters discussed at the General Synod in New Plymouth in May. A key part of the discussion related to decisions made at Synod on the issue of blessings of same-sex marriages and civil unions. A number of people have requested further information on this, and in particular what process will be followed.

It is important to realise that the issue of blessings for same-sex marriages and civil unions has been a matter for discussion in the whole of the Anglican Province of Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia for at least six to eight years now, and has been the subject of a number of reports to General Synod. In the earlier years, much of this discussion centred on matters of theology, as it was clear that there are varying interpretations of biblical authority on matters relating to homosexual relationships. A range of very different views are held by Anglicans who are nevertheless genuinely seeking to do what is pleasing to God.

This debate led in due course to the 2018 decisions of General Synod which are intended to establish mechanisms by which those who hold differing perspectives on the issue of blessings can remain in communion with one another while preserving their integrity. These arrangements have multiple dimensions, but in brief (as they impact on Parishes) decisions will be made by Bishops on a Diocese by Diocese basis (or Hui Amorangi by Hui Amorangi basis in Tikanga Maori) on whether or not blessings of same-sex marriages and civil unions will be permitted in their episcopal unit. The expectation is that they will not be permitted in some dioceses (for example Nelson) while others (for example Auckland) will allow them. +Justin and +Eleanor have announced that they will permit the blessings in the Wellington Diocese, but this will not be a blanket approval and a small committee has been established to work out the process by which applications to conduct blessings can be approved. It follows that the default position is that (without approval) a Priest cannot conduct a blessing.

The Wellington Diocesan committee looking at the process that should apply is unlikely to finish its work much before the end of the year, so at this stage it is premature to provide information on how a process might operate. However, there are some broad parameters which General Synod has set.

- In the first place, as outlined above, it's up to the Diocesan Bishop to decide whether (s)he will permit blessings to occur in the Diocese or not. (Our (Wellington Diocese) Bishops

have indicated that they will, but with limitations which presumably will be clarified in time.)

- On a Parish by Parish basis it is up to the Vicar/Priest in charge to decide whether (s)he wishes to apply for approval to conduct a blessing.
- However, there is a clear expectation that there is to be good faith consultation with the parish Vestry before a decision to apply - or not to apply - is undertaken. My understanding is that permission is unlikely to be given if the Priest and the Vestry are of differing minds on the subject (i.e. the default of no-blessing would apply in such situations).
- As with marriage the priest always maintains the right to decide not to proceed on a blessing request. (As a church, we are in favour of relationships being “right ordered” in the sense of monogamous (faithful) and committed for the long-term etc...).
- Neither Bishop nor Priest can be disciplined for a decision either to take or not to take a service of blessing for a same-sex marriage or civil union.

Our Bishops made it clear that they will be looking at approvals within a Parish context: that is, Parish Priests will not be given approval to move into another Parish to conduct a blessing. Further, General Synod has approved the liturgies that can be used for such blessings.

We are now commencing a series of discussions in Vestry about how we should approach this matter within this Parish. In the meantime, if you wish to seek factual clarification in relation to the above comments, John Whitehead (who was at General Synod and two of the three roadshows) would be happy to meet with you.

It is likely that in Onslow Parish as elsewhere in our Church, parishioners will have differing theological views on the question of blessing same-sex marriages and civil unions, and no doubt that debate will continue. The current decisions recognise this reality, and seek to find a way for us to continue to worship together in communion and with integrity despite those differences. Should you feel troubled – either spiritually or otherwise – please approach Rev Rosie, Rev Ted, Deborah or John to discuss your concerns.

## Sarah's Sunday Tea contribution

We had some parishioners ask for Sarah's recipe for the cake that she made for morning tea. She was kind enough to share it with us.

### Gluten Free Orange and Almond Cake – Patrice Meikle

- Orange (1 large or 2 small)
- 6 eggs
- ½ tsp baking soda
- Heaped tsp baking powder
- 250g ground almonds
- 250g castor sugar

Put the orange in a pot with cold water. Simmer for an hour (covered). Drain & cool.

Quarter the orange and pulp it in a food processor.

Add all other ingredients, and blend until mixed.

Pour mixture into a 20cm Springform Tin.

Bake at 180 degrees for an hour. Check it after 45 mins, or until a skewer comes out clean. You may need to cover with tin foil at the end of the cooking time.

Cool in the tin, and serve with yoghurt or put some sliced almonds or icing sugar on the top!
